'A Journey into the Past'

Some time ago I discovered that my husband's mother, Hilda Sykes, was a first cousin four times removed of Mary Sykes who was married to Sidney Hirst, a journeyman carpenter, on the 18 December 1836 in Huddersfield, Yorkshire. They had two children born to them in Yorkshire - Susan or Susannah b. 4 March 1839 and George Henry, b.27 October 1841 (Mirfield, Yorkshire) and emigrated to New Zealand on the George Fyfe in 1842, landing, I believe, in Petone, Wellington on the 7 November 1842.

They had nine (?) more children in NZ all born in the Wellington area. A large family indeed! Mary Sykes' and Hilda Sykes' common ancestor was George Sykes b. about 1765. He had a two sons, George b. 1789, and Richard b.1781, in addition to several more children. Mary's line is descended from George 1789 (her father) and Hilda

Sykes' line from Richard 1781, Marys uncle.


So we set off on a journey into the past which brought Harold and me to the other side of the world having decided to visit Taita, and Christ Church built 1853, and see just what Sidney and his accompanying settlers, then a brave and relatively small community had experienced and achieved in deciding to make a new life for themselves, and in building this church.

On Saturday 14 May we visited the church, and explored the graveyard finding not only the grave of Sidney and Mary but, amazingly, the graves of many other relatives. The weather was beautiful, and we so enjoyed its peace and tranquillity, wandering through history. Janice Henson, kindly met us and opened the church so we spent an hour able to appreciate this lovely building, so reminiscent of stone built chapels in the UK, yet having a unique life and personality of its own, a Kiwi church indeed. We were able to imagine how important the church must have been for these pioneers - not only as a place of worship, but a place to mourn, to celebrate, and to share their lives drawing strength from each other in what must surely have been a hard and demanding life.

We had arrived in time for the annual service of thanksgiving on the 15 May and met other Hirst (Sykes) relatives for the first time who made us so very welcome. We now have contact with many NZ relatives - wonderful! The service was led by Rev. John Daysh, whose pioneer descendant John Ings Daysh donated the wood for the church: the theme (aptly) one of building which emphasised for us again how important the church must have been in uniting these early

settlers, and how important it must have been for them to make the time to build when they were labouring so hard to build their own homes. We tried to imagine what the first community must have felt attending their own church for the very first time - their sense of achievement, and the feeling that they had actually begun to make a place for themselves in New Zealand. We've taken away memories and created new connections of our own 150 years later.

Christ Church, Taita is still a living church, despite its troubled times, and will, we are sure, remain a testament to the early pioneers, including our own Sidney and Mary Hirst.
