Visit by Heritage Rose Society

In November Mary and John Stevens hosted a group from the Heritage Rose Society. They were very interested in the rampant climbing rose that covers the Camellia tree to the left of the front entrance to the church. It flowers profusely, just once each year in November/December and is a joy to behold. It is called The Martyrs' Rose - Félicité-Perpétue and was developed by Antoine A. Jacques who was head gardener to the Duc d'Orleans, the future Louis-Philippe I of France, in It was recently discovered 1827. climbing old walls at Alcatraz prison, still strong years after it was planted.

Wendy Routley Seat

After a lot of discussion and planning, the gift of a seat beside the Ashes Wall to remember Wendy Routley who was a very active member of the Society and on the committee, was built in November. Our thanks go to Dave Pretty from Woodville who designed the seat and Bruce Hutton who facilitated the purchase of the native timber; together with a lot of hard work by Dave, Bruce and John Stevens. A suitable plaque has yet to be attached to the seat. This is indeed a fitting memorial to Wendy, along with the flowering cherries planted behind the ashes wall.

From the treasurer

Although the annual accounts and performance report have not yet been completed, I am pleased to be able to report that we ended our financial year on 31 January with a surplus of about \$10,000. However, all of that came from gains on our investments. The reality is that we cannot expect this in the current year and are more than likely going to see a loss in value in our investment portfolios.

The maintenance of the church and grounds will require considerable expenditure in the current year, with the cost of completing the boundary fence on the northern boundary, some major tree trimming and the ongoing need to keep the church in good condition.

Our special thanks to Placemakers Hutt City which has agreed to donate the materials for the fence.

Last year I asked all the families connected to the church to consider increasing our number of life members by signing up members of the next generation. Only one family, not an original settler family, responded to this challenge. If the Preservation Society is to continue to be able to manage and preserve our heritage, our families must step up and contribute both financially and by promoting involvement by available family members. We are at а crossroads. Can we move forward with confidence that the necessary support is there, or do we face the possibility that we will see a decline in the ability of the society to care for our taonga at Christ Church?

Early Settler – John Clement

On 03 November 1914 the Evening Post recorded - AN EARLY PIONEER - FUNERAL OF MR JOHN CLEMENT - Old identities assembled in large numbers at Taita, Lower Hutt, on Sunday, to pay their last respects to the memory of the late Mr John Clement, one of Wellington's earliest pioneers. The late Mr Clement was an ardent worker in the cause of Methodism, and among those present at the funeral were the Rev. C J Dawson and Mr. C M Luke, who had been acquainted with deceased and his work for many years past. Prior to the funeral Mr. Luke delivered an appropriate address at the home. laying stress on deceased's long and faithful services to the church. Mr. Dawson led in prayer, while hymns suitable to the occasion were sung. The service at the Taita cemetery was conducted by the Rev W Beckett, assisted by the Rev. J J Lewis, of Petone.

The late Mr. Clement arrived in Wellington as far back as 1849, and although he made his home in the Hutt Valley, he was well known by early Wellingtonians, mainly by reason of his association with the Methodist Church. He saw Wellington grow from a mere village to its present proportions, and remembered when there was no Lambton-quay worthy of the name. When visited by a Post reporter some months ago, Mr. Clement related many of his early experiences, and was particularly proud of the fact that at one time he walked regularly every Sunday from Taita to Wellington, where he conducted church services, returning to his home by foot the same day.

John Clement was buried beside his wife Sarah at Christ Church, Taita. Clement Grove in Taita was named for John Clement by the Lower Hutt City Council in 1949.

John and Sarah had 14 children, nine boys and five girls. Of the 14, only seven had issue, five of them boys and there are many descendants with the Clement surname in New Zealand today.
